

[Founding vison of NDA]

[Military Program]

In their first year, all cadets undergo the same basic military training. After they are assigned to GSDF, MSDF or ASDF, their training differs according to the service to which they have been assigned. During the academic term, all cadets receive two hours of basic field training each week, plus a six-week intensive training course in various SDF bases each year.



[Extracurricular Activities]

In General, all cadets are required to join one of the sports clubs. These are held after classes on weekdays and on holidays, and cadets are actively involved in exchanges with other universities through sports and other activities.





The Cadet Corps is composed of four battalions. Each battalion has four companies; and each company has three platoons. (About 40 cadets belong to one platoon.)

4. About ICC

ICC is the International Cadets' Conference hosted by the NDA. Some cadets from other countries are invited to this conference. The purpose of ICC is to promote mutual understanding and trust that will lead to the future security of Japan and other countries through discussions on international affairs and security. Theme of Subcommittee Future Military Forces in Space Field

In recent years, the use of space fields has become an essential part of the infrastructure of both the public and private sectors. Space has already been positioned as an "operational domain" and space security has become an issue for Japan and other countries. The technical role of the Self-Defense Forces and the military in space security will be discussed to ensure the stable use of space fields. Approximately 70% of the cadets at the National Defense Academy are science majors, and many of them are less familiar with law and international relations, which are often on the ICC agenda. Future Military Forces in Space Field subcommittee is attracting attention as a new area of security as well as a popular scientific field of study. We hope that more cadets will become interested in ICC and acquire an understanding of international affairs and diverse values, which are essential for cadets, as they enjoy discussing space fields.



Theme of Subcommittee Future Security Envisioned by LAWS

I am ASAMA Yukito, this year's 3rd Battalion ICC Chairperson. The theme of our subcommittee is "Future Security Envisioned by LAWS (Lethal Autonomous Weapons Systems)". In recent years, unmanned and AI-equipped weapons have been developed and deployed in actual warfare. Among them, LAWS is one of the weapons that has attracted the most attention. On November 1 last year, the first committee of the UN General Assembly held a discussion on LAWS. Our subcommittee will discuss the combat procedures and operational modalities of LAWS by analyzing them from the perspective of international law and granting specific situations.
